Development Standards for Single Family Homes (R1) – June 19 at the Planning Commission

he City of Santa Monica is currently updating its R1 zone district development standards. This process is addressing the growing concern about the size of new home construction in relation to the existing neighborhood context and scale, as well as identifying options on how to revise current development standards, to incentivize the retention of existing homes, and to make the development standards more user-friendly.

At the June 19th Planning Commission meeting, staff will present their recommendations, and residents will have an opportunity to comment on parcel coverage, maximum height, setbacks, stepbacks, rooftop projections, upper-story outdoor space, basements/

lightwells/excavation, parking requirements, hillside development, and design review.

For example, one-story homes are allowed 50% parcel coverage (the square footage of the home compared to the square footage of the lot). Before the Interim Zoning Ordinance (IZO), 2-story homes were allowed 61% lot coverage (the total of first and second story square footage compared to the lot).

Although the IZO reduced the allowable coverage for 2-story homes from 61% to 50%, the City Council excluded ADUs (granny flats) from the lot coverage calculation. So if homeowners add a 650 sq ft or 800 sq ft granny flat to 50% lot coverage, in reality they could possibly end up back at 61% lot coverage.

Residents have asked the city to incentivize retention of existing homes (making permits for remodeling less expensive and the process less onerous than just demolishing and building a new home).

Residents have also been concerned about solar access (i.e., protecting existing rooftop solar panels from being shaded by new construction).

- Pearl & 17th Add yellow crosswalks
- Pico & 21st No left turn from westbound Pico
- Ocean Park & 21st No right turn from eastbound OPB: 4 PM –7 PM; Signal timing modifications
- Ocean Park & Euclid Install delineators to restrict all left turns
- Navy & 21st Convert to 4-way stop
- Dewey & 21st No left turn from southbound 21st: 4 PM – 7 PM
- 23rd Street Add green paint to bike lane from Ashland or Hill to Dewey
- Ashland & 23rd Convert to 4-way stop; remove rapid flash beacon
- Dewey & 23rd Right turn only from eastbound Dewey
- Lincoln & Ozone No right turn from northbound Lincoln: 7 AM – 9 AM; Right turn only from westbound Ozone

Pico Blvd. – Presentation of Proposed Changes – June 13 at FOSP

Planning staff will be making apresentation about the proposed changes for Pico Blvd. and inviting input at the June 13 FOSP meeting – 7 PM – at Mt. Olive Church. In September 2018, Pico neighborhood residents, as part of the "Pico Wellbeing Project," were invited to "Please join your friends and neighbors for a series of interactive workshops this fall on displacement and gentrification. Learn about ways to preserve and empower your neighborhood! This series will allow you to share your thoughts with City staff, hear from experts about available tools to address gentrification, and give you the knowledge to advocate for your future."

However, by May 2019, unbeknownst to the FOSP Board, preventing "displacement and gentrification" in the Pico residential neighborhood had apparently been set aside by Planning staff as a goal, in favor of upzoning both sides of Pico Blvd. between Euclid and Centinela. The northern border of the Sunset Park Neighborhood is the center line of Pico Blvd.

Between June 2018 and February 2019, twelve presentations were made to various "community-based organizations" in the Pico neighborhood and later to Santa Monica College. No presentation was offered to FOSP, the city-recognized neighborhood organization for Sunset Park.

SMMUSD — Senior Exemption for Measure "R" Parcel Tax – June 30 Deadline

n 2008, the voters of Santa Monica and Malibu approved by 73% the Measure R parcel tax, which combines and replaces the previous Measures Y and S parcel taxes, contains a CPI-U adjustment, and allows those senior citizens who meet the following criteria to be exempted from the tax:

- Senior property owner must be at least 65 years of age by June 30th for the year the exemption application is submitted
- Senior must own and be residing in their property as their primary residence

How to Apply

Attention: Only use this application form for NEW applications. Parcels that received an exemption in 2018–2019 and continue to meet the eligibility criteria will be automatically exempted for 2019–2020. If you wish to check your status, please email MeasureR@smmusd.org with your name and address or parcel number.



Santa Monica Airport – Removal of Excess Pavement to Commence June 16

he City of Santa Monica shortened the airport runway to an operational length of 3,500 feet through markings and signage in December 2017. The excess pavement at both ends of the runway is no longer used for aviation purposes. Sully-Miller Construction will remove and pulverize the excess pavement from areas of the Airport that are no longer needed for aviation purposes and hydroseed certain parts of those areas.

The removal of the excess pavement will commence on June 16 and is anticipated to be completed by September 6.

Sully-Miller Construction, the City's contractor, will perform the work in five phases:

- Phase 1: Construction will take place from 9 PM to 7 AM daily, Sunday through Friday, from June 16 through July 5 (excludes July 4 holiday).
- ➤ Phase 2: Construction is anticipated to take place 24 hours per day from midnight July 8 through 11:59 PM on July 11 (four consecutive days).
- Phase 3: Construction will take place from 9 PM to 7 AM daily on Sunday through Friday from July 14 through August 2.
- Phase 4: Construction is anticipated to take place 24 hours per day from midnight August 5 through 11:59 PM on August 8 (four consecutive days).
- Phase 5: Construction will take place from 9 PM to 7 AM daily, Sunday through Friday, from August 11 through Sep-

tember 6 (excludes September 2 Labor Day holiday).

The Airport will be closed to all aircraft operations during the days and hours that construction will take place. During construction, community members should expect noise that will be generated from the construction site.

The City will do all it can to minimize the impacts of the construction to residents. This will include working with Sully-Miller Construction to conduct daily noise monitoring to ensure that the construction complies with the local ordinance.

Santa Monica College – June 14 Deadline

Santa Monica College (SMC) is seeking applications for the Citizens Bond Oversight Committee, which oversees the implementation of the bond measures that are funding capital improvement projects at the college:

- ➤ Measure U (2002 \$160 million)
- ➤ Measure S (2004 \$135 million)
- ➤ Measure AA (2008 \$295 million)
- ➤ Measure V (2016 \$345 million)

The application deadline is Friday, June 14. The vacancies are specifically for representatives of local business communities of Santa Monica and Malibu. Applications are available at www.smc.edu/CBOCApp To qualify for appointment, an applicant must be at least 18 years old; must not be a college employee or official; and must not be a vendor, contractor or consultant to the college.

It will apparently cost property owners in Santa Monica and Malibu approximately \$2 billion to pay off the \$935 million in bonds, including interest. And, it seems from recent telephone surveys, that SMC is considering putting another bond measure on the November 2020 ballot – this time for \$300 million.

Proposed City Budget – June 5 at City Council

he overall budget for the City of Santa Monica is \$712.1 million in Fiscal Year (FY) 2019–20 and \$755.9 million in FY 2020–21. It reflects the operating and capital activities of 30 funds across 15 departments and approximately 2,300 permanent and temporary full-time-equivalent positions that provide the City's public safety, quality of life, infrastructure construction and maintenance, transportation and development-related services, and the internal governance services that support them.

The largest component of the budget is the General Fund — \$418.9 million in FY 2019–20 and \$503.3 million in FY 2020-21. The Citywide budget also includes a number of enterprise and special revenue funds. Among the larger funds, the Resource Recovery and Recycling (RRR), Water, Wastewater, Big Blue Bus (BBB), Beach, Airport, and Cemetery funds have sufficient revenue to cover operational and capital needs. Two funds are projected to require subsidies: the Housing Authority Fund and the Pier Fund.

On June 5, beginning at 6 pm, the City Council will discuss the budget. Public Comment is limited to 2 minutes each. Meanwhile, the Pico Neighborhood Association (PNA), the city-recognized neighborhood organization for the Pico neighborhood, dropped out of the process when it became apparent that PNA's major concern since 2015, displacement and gentrification, was not going to be addressed.

On May 15, Planning staff recommended to the Planning Commission a series of changes to the Zoning Ordinance and Official Districting Map to modify land use regulations on commercial properties on Pico Blvd., including the south side of Pico, which is part of the Sunset Park neighborhood.

The land use proposal includes changes to existing regulations that would make it easier for dance studios, gyms, small restaurants, and cultural facilities to locate on Pico Blvd. Certain businesses, such as childcare, personal services, and small retail would be allowed to expand from 40 feet of storefront width to 50 feet.

Restaurants would no longer have a 50-seat limit. And, businesses that have long been prohibited from certain portions of Pico Blvd., such as new bars or night-clubs, medium-scale retail, and health clinics would be allowed to apply for space through a conditional use permit (CUP).

Some Sunset Park residents are concerned that these changes, if adopted, could lead to landlords increasing rents, and thus driving out some of the local family-owned businesses that we treasure.

FOSP requested that the Commission delay voting on the Planning Department recommendations until the FOSP Board had a chance to discuss the 50-page staff report. https://tinyurl.com/yy785m9l

City Council Districts

n May 6, the California Court of Appeal granted the City of Santa Monica's request for an expedited briefing and argument schedule in Pico Neighborhood Association, et al. v. City of Santa Monica. By granting this request, the Court of Appeal agreed to a briefing schedule to allow a decision in the case to be issued on or before July 10, 2020, giving the City time to plan for a November 2020 election. While the appeal is pending, the current Council members will remain in place, and the City will not be required to conduct district-based elections. Learn the routine on the morning of July 4th at 8:30 AM in front of City Hall while waiting for the parade to begin at 9:30 AM. All ages welcome!


